



1 Minute Guide to Modern Slavery

Slavery can look different in the modern age.



This guidance is intended to help practitioners understand the issues of modern slavery and details the path a practitioner should take to risk assess and safeguard the adult.



Trafficking in people is a serious crime and is now referred to under the term "Modern Slavery." The Care Act 2014 includes modern slavery as a type of abuse. The commonly used definition of human trafficking is often referred to as the 'Palermo Protocol'.



"Trafficking in Persons" means: 'The recruitment, transportation, transfer, harbouring or receipt of persons, by means of the threat or use of force or other forms of coercion, of abduction, of fraud, of deception, of the abuse of power, or a position of vulnerability, or the giving or receiving of payments or benefits to achieve the consent of a person having control over another person, for the purpose of exploitation', Palermo Protocol.



Modern Slavery involves the exploitation of a person and legislation mentions holding the person in slavery or servitude or requiring the person to carry out forced or compulsory labour.



What do I do if I suspect modern slavery?

If the potential victim remains in the place of exploitation, is in danger or requires immediate assistance dial 999.

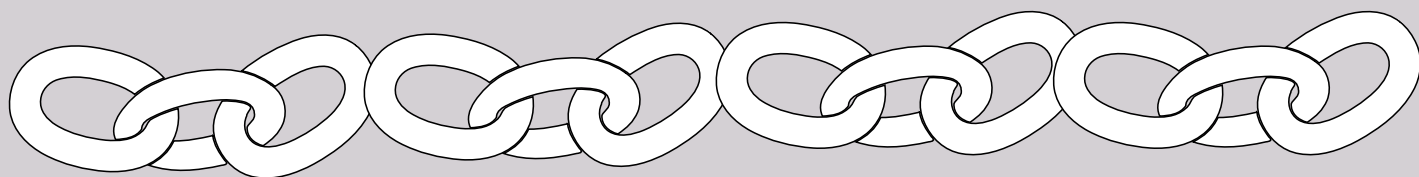

The National Referral Mechanism (NRM) is the process by which an individual is identified as a victim of modern slavery. Referrals to the NRM can only be made by agencies known as First Responders.
